It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to our latest school prospectus. For over half a century, Archbishop McGrath has existed as a Catholic High School to serve all parts of the County Borough of Bridgend.

As a school with less than 900 learners aged 11-18, we pride ourselves on our ability to get know our learners and their families.

Those who attend our school choose to do so because of our Catholic ethos and our track-record of academic excellence. In addition to this, and equally as important, learner wellbeing is at the heart of all that we do. As our mission statement states, 'we aim for all our learners to leave us as Empowered, Virtuous and Employable individuals'.

Outcomes at GCSE and 'A' level are consistently very strong and we are very proud of the fact that over 90% our our sixth form university applicants are accepted at their first choice of university.

With a school building that is less than fifteen years old, our learners benefit from being taught in excellent facilities - modern classrooms, specialist laboratories and workshops, excellent IT facilities and a wide range of sports facilities. These include a dance studio, sports hall and a floodlit 3G pitch.

Whilst we are a Catholic school, it is important for parents and carers to be aware that we accept pupils of all faiths and backgrounds - we are a fully inclusive school community.

We enjoy excellent links with our four main partner primary schools - St. Mary's Catholic Primary, Bridgend, St. Roberts Catholic Primary, Aberkenfig, St. Mary's and St Patricks Catholic Primary, Maesteg and Archdeacon John Lewis Church in Wales Primary, Brackla. In addition to these schools, we accept pupils from over fifteen other schools from across Bridgend county.

As well as our Year 6 and 6th Form Open Evenings that take place annually during the Autumn term, parents and carers are welcome to make an appointment to visit our school during the school day in order to experience first-hand our unique atmosphere and Christian ethos.

About our school

We are a voluntary aided mixed 11-18 school in the Archdiocese of Cardiff. We serve the parishes of the Bridgend Deanery. We were established 50 years ago to provide a Christian medium education for students in the County Borough of Bridgend.

Our students travel from Maesteg, Bridgend, Porthcawl and the Ogmore and Garw Valleys with a small number travelling from the Vale and further afield.

Students are from predominantly English speaking homes. The school's intake is from a varied social background and represents the full range of abilities. There are just under 850 students on roll and we are oversubscribed in all year groups. The sixth form community has grown steadily over the last 5 years with approximately 130 on roll in Years 12 and 13.

We offer a full range of GCSE and A-level courses as well as a number of vocational options. Sixth form students also have access to a number of A-level courses provided as part of our strong collaborative links with neighbouring schools and Bridgend College.





Our Curriculum

We have developed a curriculum to fully address the requirements of the Welsh Government whilst ensuring, we keep "Christ at the Centre" at all times.

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Our work in developing our curriculum has ensured learners will experience an authentic, broad and balanced curriculum covering all Areas of Learning and the cross-curricular themes. In addition to literacy, numeracy and digital skills, there will be six areas of learning and experience. Everything our children learn will be connected to these areas:

- Humanities
- Expressive Arts
- Health and Well-being
- Languages, Literacy and Communication
- Science and Technology
- Mathematics and Numeracy

The curriculum also covers:


- human rights

Our Curriculum

Most year groups have five teaching classes. Some specialist subjects such as Design Technology are taught in smaller groups for safety reasons.

Classes are arranged in broad ability based bands with some subjects able to set by ability.

We believe in having high expectations for all our learners and outcomes at GCSE and 'A'-Level are consistently very strong.





Wellbeing, Pastoral Care & Work Related

Education

Pupils at our school are able to access a wealth of wellbeing support.

All learners have a form tutor who is their first point of contact. Where possible, form tutors remain with the same class for the duration of years 7 - 11.

Each Year group has a Leader of Wellbeing who is in charge of the form tutor team and has overall responsibility for the pastoral care for their year group. A member of the senior leadership team is also linked to each year group

In addition to our five Leaders of Wellbeing, we have KS3 and KS4 Wellbeing Support Officers and these provide excellent additional support for pupils and their families.

Our Head of Sixth form provides support for Years 12 and 13. As well as pastoral care, the Head of Sixth form provides a wide range of advice for those who are applying to study at University. Our Sixth Form Engagement officer is also on hand to support students with all aspects of post-16 life including such as attendance and emotional support.

Our Lead (Youth) Work is based at the school for part of the week and provides additional support to some learners.

Learners also have access to our Careers Wales Officer who is based part-time at the school. This supplements the careers and work-related advice learners are given during lessons and from outside speakers.


Religious Education & Collective Worship

All pupils in Years 7-13 study Religious Education. All pupils in Year 11 study for the WJEC Religious Studies GCSE. Many students choose to study RS at 'A' level in the 6th form.

The school has thriving junior and youth chaplaincy teams and these are supported by our RE department staff. Our School Chaplain is Fr. Mark Rowles.

All pupils have year group assemblies each week as well as class prayer during registration. All year groups celebrate Mass every Friday on a rota basis.

The school, many pupils and staff play an active roll in the local parish of St. Mary's. Fr. Tim McGrath, Parish Priest of St. Mary's and Deacon Philip Manghan are also members of our school Chaplaincy team and visit the school on a weekly basis.

Support for all

We have excellent opportunities for our more-able and talented pupils including access to the SEREN programme. We also enjoy strong links with the prestigious Wellington College, Berkshire and every year a small number of learners are enrolled onto their Wheeler Programme.

We realise that not all learners make progress at the same rate and some will need extra support in order for them to be able to fulfill their potential.

Some of our learners have access to a wide range of interventions including literacy and numeracy support. For others, we link in with outside agencies in order to provide them with emotional and behavioural interventions.

Our therapy dog, Ice, has been a welcome addition to the school support team and his visits are hugely popular with pupils and staff.

Our ALN department is staffed by a dedicated team of support staff and is led by our ALNCo. They are located in a designated suite of rooms which includes our pupil progress centre.

Sport, Music and Extra-Curricular provision

The school aims to instil a positive attitude towards physical activity and to encourage the participation and enjoyment of sport by all. The school recognises the importance of physical activity and its contribution to promoting the wellbeing and health of all pupils.

A wide range of sporting activities are offered through time-tabled PE lessons and through extra-curricular activities. Regular fixtures are held with local schools for Netball, Basketball, Rugby and Football. Wherever possible, pupils are encouraged to compete at school, local, regional or national levels.

Our Music department hosts three concerts per year with all those in receipt of peripatetic lessons expected to take part.

The school has a growing orchestra, wind band, choir and various other ensembles depending on the talents available each year.

There are a vast array of leadership opportunities available for pupils of all abilities. They include Prefects, Sports Leaders, Food Ambassadors, Chaplaincy team and Cyber Ambassadors.

A number of departments host clubs at lunchtimes including chess, badminton, crochet and board games. Our Code Club has won numerous local and national competitions in recent years.







Site security

Welsh Language
